The Road to Hana

It's nine in the morning Maui time during April vacation and I'm up to my waist in a silty rainforest pool. I'm inching ever so slowly, deeper and deeper, wondering when the drop off is going to come and I'm going to slip over my head into the cold, rushing water. John Pacelli told me there were no snakes on Maui but I'm looking above in the hanging trees, into the dense undergrowth beside me and shuffling my feet just waiting for that snaky slither to move across my ankle. What the heck am I thinking?

The two guys on the audio CD guide to Hana didn't talk about fording streams to get to the last of the twin waterfalls that were about a mile off the road. They told jokes, sang "On The Road Again," pointed out pineapple fields and nice restaurants, but when it came to the details of how to get to places off the road, they didn't say much. Of course it was "The Road to Hana" CD, not "Stuff Off the Road." And besides, I should have guessed I was getting in over my head when I saw a parking lot full of people, but not a soul on the trail we were following. Where did they go? Why am I the only one here? Why has no one else come to this picture perfect rainforest waterfall?

None of these questions crossed my mind. When my family and I got to this spot, we already had to ford a shallow stream and climb over a slippery dam, and now we had to wade into a river without being able to judge the depth or inhabitants. All I was thinking as I started into the rushing water was, "I can't believe that people don't want to walk this far—they must be lazy." It never crossed my mind that I was nuts until I was in the middle of the stream awaiting the oncoming, invisible snakes.

Suddenly, the water began to get shallower. Soon, only my ankles were covered. (I still couldn't see my feet through the silt, and I knew that snake was coming.) Things seemed to be getting better. I could make it to the pool formed by the waterfall and inched my way around the muddy path that wound along a rock ledge behind the rushing water. I'd made it and went back to drag the other members of my family along. (Check out my blog to see the evidence.)

Yes, it's a good story but what does it have to do with learning? Well, as I stood there wondering about snakes, I began thinking about what we ask children to do. How often do they blindly follow us into the unknown? They trust that we will keep them safe, that we will guide them through tasks so that they can be successful. It's a role that both parents and teachers play. We ask our children to try new things, to stretch their abilities, to leave their comfort zone. They do it because they trust us and know that we won't let them get hurt.

I trusted the two guys who sounded so friendly on the CD. "Thousands of people must have done this," I thought as I waded through the uncharted waters. I guess that it doesn't take much to build that trust—but one snakebite would have ruined it forever! I made it, and was rewarded with a sense of accomplishment and a beautiful experience. I wish the same for our children as they travel the road to adulthood.

This month's recipe from Eating Well Magazine: Southwestern Omelet Wrap

Folding a flat omelet in a whole-wheat wrapper makes a high-protein breakfast that is portable and fun.

Ingredients:

- 1 large egg
- 1 large egg white
- 1/2 teaspoon hot sauce

freshly ground pepper, to taste

- 1 tablespoon chopped scallions
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh cilantro, or parsley (optional)
- 2 tablespoons prepared black bean dip
- 1 9-inch whole-wheat wrap
- 1 teaspoon canola oil
- 2 tablespoons grated pepper jack or cheddar cheese
- 1 tablespoon prepared green or red salsa (optional)

Instructions:

Set oven rack 6 inches from the heat source; preheat broiler. Stir eggs, hot sauce and pepper briskly with a fork in a medium bowl. Stir in scallions and cilantro (or parsley), if using.

If black bean dip is cold, warm it in the microwave on high for 10–20 seconds. Place wrap between paper towels and warm in the microwave on high for about 10 seconds. Spread bean dip over the wrap, leaving a 1-inch border all around.

Brush oil over a 10-inch nonstick skillet; heat over medium heat. Add the egg mixture and cook, lifting the edges with a heat-resistant rubber spatula so uncooked egg will flow underneath, until the bottom is light golden, 20–30 seconds. Place the skillet under the broiler and broil just until the top is set, 20–30 seconds. Immediately slide the omelet onto the wrap. Sprinkle with cheese. Fold the edges over the omelet on two sides, then roll the wrap up and around the omelet. Serve immediately, with salsa, if desired.

Notes from the Health Office: Ticks

With spring comes rain and an influx of ticks. Ticks bites are usually harmless, but they may carry diseases including Lyme Disease. Protect yourself and your children from tick bites by making a habit of thoroughly checking yourself and your children for ticks after outdoor activities and vacations. Also remember these tips:

- 1. Always wear shoes and wear long pants tucked into socks while in the woods and long grass.
- 2. Use a EPA approved tick repellent and follow the directions before and after using.
- 3. If you do have to remove a tick, watch the bite site and call your doctor if you notice anything unusual about it.
